- Approval of a new updated website. Due to unforeseen hiccups we are going to update the existing website, then build a fresh one to rival the best ones in Oz's Mensheds.
- A project manager will be assigned to major jobs, for instance the Metal Machinery Concreting job (in this case Dieter). Donated roller doors and fitout need to be coordinated and it has been decided it is best to be done through one person who then knows the full story and manages the schedule. Jimmy Moffat managed to acquire some free reo for the job and our thanks to Jimmy and Roscoe's Timber and Hardware supplies at 1 Vineyard Rd Sunbury for the generous donation.



- The food and drink insulated BBQ storage trailer is almost finished and will be painted and registered in the new year ready for work at events such as Bunning Sausage sizzle and market days. A big thank you to Kevin Swaffield who has put his heart and soul into this over the last 6 months.
- No further news has come in over the \$40,000 extension budget from the Vic Government and we are hopeful it will be approved in the next Budget. The Shed is running out of room for safe working conditions and we had hoped to expand. When construction of the machinery shed is completed, it will help to alleviate the space issue temporarily, by moving the metal works into the machinery shed area freeing up space for the bulk of woodworking projects. It will also separate the metal men from the woodwork boys.
- Hume City Council has donated a Community Grant of \$1,650 through its
 City Council's Community Grants Program for which the Men's Shed is very
 grateful and the money will be put to good use.
- There was a break-in at the Shed at the weekend; a hole was cut through the chainmesh fence. A lawn mower and whipper snipper were stolen. Security to be enhanced. Alarm system could be considered.
- The "**Dr Who Tardis"** produced from CAD drawing to actual structure was completed for the Sunbury Youth Centre. It has now been delivered, assembled and will be painted by the youth members. A photo-shoot of the project will be made available for an article in the Local Newspaper. A good effort by all concerned and great advertising for the Shed.
