Lucky is lucky....!!!





My Memories of Ted by Dieter 12/10/2016. Last Year's Shed President. And a very good one too—Editor.

It was and still is my pleasure to have known Ted Crow. Ted's first and foremost priority was his grandkids whom he loved dearly, then naturally came family and close friends—but running a very close third place in his heart came our Men's Shed. Ted was a quiet and unassuming bloke who turned up at our Shed one morning saying, "Centrelink told me to come down to see if there's anything I can help here by way of contribution to my required 15 weekly hours I need to qualify for my dole payments. I've been retrenched."

So Mike got him started at our Shed and it wasn't long before he became a valuable member here. He always seemed to be the first bloke to grab a broom or a vacuum cleaner and clean up someone else's mess at the end of our mornings and do the myriad other little things to keep our Shed going.

If you needed a hand with a task Ted was your man. And if he didn't quite under-

stand the instructions for the task, he'd ask for clarification and keep asking and paraphrasing until he understood. Ted was never afraid to ask a "dumb question" as he reasoned that only a fool knows everything about a particular task at hand. One of the major tasks I set Ted was to fabricate and peg into position the formwork required for pouring of the welding shed concrete floor. After questioning me as to the procedure and materials required, he quietly went about his way and tied off the reinforcement ready for the concrete pour. Ted, being a L.A.M.E. (Licenced Aircraft Mechanical Engineer) never needed to include Concrete Form Fixer on his Resume but I would gladly have given him a reference for it should the need ever arisen. His workmanship was excellent. Needless to say, Ted quietly told me of his pride at doing a good job of the task, obviously quite proud of it he was! To me, Ted Crow is still a friend, even though I don't see him at the Shed any more. However, Ted lives on in my memories and I frequently smile fondly of those memories. As far as I am concerned, a friend doesn't die or pass away until memories of them cease. Well done Ted Crow.










Nat and Frank have started our Shed ebay adventures and will sell all excess equipment this way. Our trash will be someone else's treasure!

## Doing our bit to help the unemployed



Sunbury Men's Shed will become a Work for the Dole Host Organisation - engaging Unemployed men of ages 30 –49 through Centrelink to carry out Community Projects- participants will be engaged for 15 hours per week

Work for the Dole places job seekers in activities where they can gain skills and experience that give back to the community and can help them find a job.

The first project we will be involved with making garden beds for a Glenroy Community Group planning to grow vegetables to feed the local needy. The initial requirement will be for 35 garden beds.

To this end a bit of research was done by our in-house Chippies, John Hunter and Peter Wilkinson, who after many hours sweating over the drawing board came up with a design that should fit the bill. With material list in hand it was a trip to Bunnings for the timber and then construction of the prototype in the workshop last Saturday morning ably assisted by Garry Pettit. The final result for presentation to the Glenroy Community group for evaluation is shown below.







If the design/prototype is approved the Work for the Dole participants will be guided and instructed in making another 34 of the raised garden beds in which we hope lots of vegies will be grown for the local Glenroy community.
