Work for the Dole project Status







A number of issues were raised that we were unaware of and with the help of Cecelia Brady our next planning permit application will contain all the necessary information required by Planning and Traffic department to enable them to make an informed decision.

It has taken time, but with a positive attitude and the correct information on our next application we may be able to proceed with our much-needed expansion in the not too distant future.

Well done to those involved and thanks to Cecelia Brady for her assistance!

So where is the support for the Men's Shed, which was initially established in the late 1970s as a result of retired male suicides and male depression in the community?

The shire has not contributed one penny to the shed's building fund, yet has the nerve to say that it is an age-friendly council.

Of course, the men's increasingly dire situation could easily be solved were it able to move into the old Coliban Water depot.

Our local state member, Mary-Anne Thomas, has already done a marvellous job in obtaining some \$31.5 million for Kyneton's new primary school, the new community health hub for Cobaw Health, and \$1.5 million for the Holgate Brewery.

But surely an additional \$350,000 for the Coliban Water depot would not rock the state's coffers.

This building and land would also provide garaging for the Macedon Ranges SES's new \$200,000 vehicle, assist with storage for community equipment owned by Lions and Rotary clubs, and provide meeting facilities for several community clubs. Now is the time for the nonsense to stop and for common sense to prevail. The Kyneton Men's Shed is far too important to this town to lose. BRIAN WARD, Kyneton
