Shed Issues and Committee Happenings

- **Hearing tests** will be conducted at the Shed on Monday 12th February by Australian Hearing.
- The Sub Committee consisting of Fred Parnis, Ian Baird and Trevor Dunn set up to collect and represent member ideas for the fitting out of the new shed extension, have requested submissions for ideas on its use from members. Certificate of Completion has been obtained. Submissions for shed use proposals are now being reviewed and results will be provided to committee for discussion.
- Frank Zambello and Nat Perri attemded the Hume Council Grants Awards night and collected \$1,650 for the purchase and installation of a hot water service. This will now be purchased and installed.
- The SES conducted their regular inspection of the fire extinguishers at the Shed. They noted we did not have any in the new Shed and requested we obtain some which is being looked into.
- Members need to refrain from depositing material obtained around the Shed as it is unsightly and unsafe. Also more tip runs need to be conducted.
- A monthly trip to the Gisborne market has been proposed to sell a lot of "stuff" we have made and accumulated.
- Ted Riley announce that there has been a large tool donation made to the Shed which will need to be picked up and managed accordingly.
- A large number of pavers have been donated by Linda in Sunbury. These will be used to landscape parts of the Shed surrounds.
- **Ted Riley to make a larger** letterbox for the Shed.
- The welding shop is to remain in it's present position contrary to rumours that it may be moved in the new Shed extension.
- **Solar Hot water service grants will now be sought** in line with installations taking place in other Men's Sheds.
- The instant hot water service in the kitchen needs to be replaced; lan Lupson to purchase a new one

The wall panes will be selected and colour coordinated to make the Shed extension a bright and happy place.

The Sunbury Historical Society requested the loan of the Barbecue trailer which the Shed has agreed to as well as provide a free bottle of LPG gas.

After Australia Day, the barbecue trailer will be refurbished including some signwriting to reflect the Shed's ownership **Drainage needs to be investigated** and constructed before any paving is carried out.

The electrical work in the new Shed will be performed by Kevin Wood and others outside the Shed.

Hot weather risks and staying cool



Did you know that heatwaves have killed more Australians than all other natural hazards combined.*

While most people find extremely hot weather and heatwaves uncomfortable, some people have a higher risk than others of becoming ill. These include:

- elderly people aged over 75 years
- babies and young children · people with long term health conditions, e.g. heart or respiratory disease, diabetes or circulatory diseases · people who are obese
- people taking certain medicines
- people who are socially isolated
- people who work outdoors or in hot and poorly ventilated areas
- people engaging in vigorous physical activity in hot weather
- people who are not acclimatised to the heat, for example overseas visitors. I

It's important to keep drinking water even if you don't feel thirsty. Avoid alcoholic, hot or sugary drinks (including tea and coffee) because these can make dehydration worse.

Keeping as cool as possible can also help you prevent heat-related illness. Make sure you stay out of the sun. Drink cold drinks and eat smaller, cold meals, such as salads and fruit; this can also help you to keep cool. Other things to do include wearing light-coloured and loose-fitting clothes made from natural fibres such as cotton, and taking cool showers or baths.

Keep your house cool by shutting curtains and blinds during the day. If you don't have airconditioning, go to a cool place such as a library, shopping centre, cinema or swimming pool. Stay in the coolest room in the house and use the stove and oven as little as possible.

Visit or call elderly friends, neighbours or relatives at least once a day. Check they have water in the fridge and encourage them to drink it. You may like to take them to a shopping centre, library or cinema with air-conditioning. Children also need to be reminded to drink water. Babies, children or animals should never be left alone in a car, even if the air-conditioner is on. Ensure animals have water and plenty of shade if they are outside.

It is important to ensure that food that needs refrigeration is properly stored. Defrost foods in the fridge, not on the kitchen bench.

This is just a taste of some of the topics that are presented at each monthly meeting of the Heartbeat Victoria Sunbury Branch.




