Dieter staying busy during the COVID 19

Since the dreaded Covid 19 arrived in our district early in the year (it seems so long ago now!) I've been busy whittling away at my vast "to do" list as I've managed to rearrange most higher priorities so that the refurbishing of my shed became my top priority, so since May I've been refurbishing my 3.8 x 4.4m weatherboard shed.

Firstly, the shed needed emptying! Boy, what a job that was!! So much GOOD stuff had to be stored offsite, so a 20ft container was hired for storage in Maryborough (only \$20/wk) and once I'd stuffed that to the gills the remainder went into our Kyneton storage. It took a month to empty the shed.

The plasterboard ceiling, wall lining, timber flooring (the shed's on stumps), windows, and electricals were ripped out and any rotten studs and floor joists (termites & wet rot) were replaced and finally in the first week of June the shed structure was weatherproof and structurally sound and ready for its internal fit-out.

The rockwool wall insulation was held in place with 25mm wide strips cut from a roll of 125mm wide plastic Damp-proof membrane (\$8/30m roll) and a friend of a friend installed the new LED flouros and power points. The interior wall cladding is 12mm ply as I want to be able to nail/screw heavy things to the walls. I had 3 sheets of ply in storage so used them in the most needed areas. When I can travel again, I'll get the other 14 ply sheets from northern Victoria at a good price.

Next, I erected a timber framed 800mm deep mezzanine storage rack around all four walls at 2.2m above floor level. This gave me a height of 450 – 750mm above the mezzanine floor to store good stuff, (you won't find any useless stuff in my shed!! haha).

Suspended from the mezzanine framing are 450 deep, metal-framed steel sheeted two level shelves running right around the shed walls. The material for those was found in the bush near Tennant Creek (N.T.). I salvaged 28 lengths of 30mm x 1800 long square metal tube and 18 sections of 450 x 900 steel shelving trays. (Owning a van does have its upside!)

A potbelly stove made from a 15litre LPG cylinder sits in one corner, and a 220litre fridge/freezer sleeps in another corner. There's a big piece of woolblend carpet on the floor so I'm not concerned about welding inside the shed as the carpet doesn't carry a flame. The potbelly stove needs a bigger flue/chimney as the air in the shed gets smoky on a cold night if I stoke up the fire too much. The red fire extinguisher by the bench is repurposed as a portable high pressure air storage cylinder.

An old B&D radial Arm Saw sits on a castored workbench and an old 600mm deep tallboy is now fitted with castors and side drop-leaves and serves as another workbench. Other benching and shelving has been built using salvaged materials purchased from the Tip Shop, (good value bargains!!).

Next on the list for the shed is to refurbish the shed's veranda, but as we are also minding our 2.5yo grandson (little "Tassie devil")on a regular basis, so that'll have to wait until the Tip Shop opens up again, but in the meantime it sure is great to sit by my warm stove with a beer in my shed listening to my music on a cold clear night.

There's still heaps to do to complete the shelving and other things, however the immediate need to stay warm in the shed is done and I now work in reasonable comfort.

So stay healthy in mind and body until we can meet again down at our Men's Shed!






