During his physical, the doctor asked the patient about his daily activity.


He described a typical day this way:

For those that are already playing or are interested in playing, please contact me and I can discuss further with you to arrange a game among the Shedders or even help you get started.



Welding Tips and Tricks—How to weld the right Way



Mark a line with a carbide scribe or workworkers awl, and cut with a metal-cutting chop saw or a hacksaw. For a strong weld, clean the metal with a degreaser



Next, grind or file a slight bevel along the edges you're welding. This ensures the weld penetrates as deeply as possible and countersinks it so you can grind it flush. Don't overdo it or you'll burn through the metal when you weld
