



MILNE MATHEWS AND HIS WICKING BEDS

This is how a wicking bed is produced

- First of was a IBC {intermediate bulk container}, cut it in half and that gave us 2 beds
- Then painted the outside as they are not UV stabilized
- Next two milk creates and cut them down a third of there height
- Wrapped them in geo fabric that forms avoid where water can be stored
- In the bottom is a layer of Lucerne mulch, old leaves, grass etc,
- Next is a few blocks of rotten wood, next is a good layer of coco fibre (ground coco nut husks)
- Then mushroom compost then sheep manure and to top it off was a bag of good potting mix and more Lucerne mulch
- The proof is there, and the president has ordered 4 more

First Catch Your Rabbit

The famous 18th century cook Hannah Glasse is credited with the decisive instruction – "When you want to make a rabbit pie, first catch your rabbit" For the contrarians amongst us, it wasn't Mrs Beeton.

So it was, when The Men's Shed (Sunbury) wanted to make a board room table, we first had to cut down a tree. Well, many trees actually.

Confused, OK let's go back to the beginning and catch that 'pesky wabbit'

When Winslow Infrastructure secured the contract to widen the Sunbury Road, they had little choice but to fell a significant number of sugar gums bordering the existing road. Lothe as they were to undertake this essential part of the project, Winslow were more disturbed that they would be forced to dispose of the felled timber as wood chips.

Fortunately, friends of friends of friends now entered the picture and offered the wood to The Shed for future projects and for sale. How lucky we were when the timber was cut into slabs, stored for eighteen months, and eventually delivered to us for storage in one of our containers.

The story could have ended there except Winslow wanted something just a little different than a few kilometres of bitumen and some photos to remember Sunbury by. And they decided that a board room table, from these very slabs, for their Port Melbourne headquarters would be perfect.

From there most of you will have seen the progressive construction of this enormous table in Shed 2, and the monumental work undertaken – especially by Steve King and Foahala Powell.

Our regular members will undoubtably recall the special jig made to make the slabs parallel, the grunt work needed to lift and pass the slabs through the thicknesser (time after time after time), the jointing process to make the full sized table top, the filling of cracks and knots with resin hardener, the cutting and welding of square tube steel for the legs (how did we ever get that to the sandblaster/powder coater), and finally the application of a robust vanish to provide an attractive and hard-wearing finish.

And it is in this final process we would like to render our sincere thanks for the valuable assistance offered by Steve Irvine from Croma Coatings. Steve gave us advice on which of their many coatings would be most suitable and points about its application.

Ken Garth used his expertise on the pantograph engraver (you're never allowed to go on holiday Ken) to produce an appropriate brass nameplate as the cherry on the top.

So now it's complete and shortly an armoured tank moving truck will be employed to transfer this momentous piece to its new home.


