"Do you have trouble peeing, too?" asked the 60-year old.


"No, I pee every morning at 6:00. I pee like a racehorse on a flat rock -- no problem at all."

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Just a Reminder about getting ripped off

Phishing emails often masquerade as urgent communi- your subscription status. For more information on how cations from reputable institutions, such as banks or government agencies, attempting to lure individuals into providing sensitive information. Recognizing these deceptive emails is crucial for protecting your personal data. Typically, they contain telltale signs such as generic greetings, spelling and grammar mistakes, and suspicious links or attachments. They may also convey a false sense of urgency, pressuring the recipient to act quickly. Always verify the sender's email address, be wary of unsolicited requests for personal information, and never click on links or download attachments from unknown sources. By staying vigilant and informed, you can safeguard your online presence against these fraudulent schemes.


Fig 1 It's good that you're questioning the legitimacy of the email, as it's a common tactic for scammers to impersonate reputable companies like McAfee to trick individuals into providing personal information or making payments for services they don't need. These fraudulent emails often create a sense of urgency, claiming that your subscription is expiring and must be renewed immediately. They may even include a link or a phone number to contact, which leads to a fake customer service representative ready to take your details or money. Always remember to never click on any links or make any payments through these emails. Instead, go directly to the official website or contact customer service through verified channels if you need to check

to protect yourself from such scams, you can refer to the comprehensive guide on the McAfee website.

Recognizing a scam email can be quite straightforward once you know what to look for. Often, these fraudulent messages will claim to be from reputable companies, like in your example where it's supposedly from 'Bigpond support'. However, the devil is in the details. The layout may seem off, not aligning with the professional standards such companies usually adhere to. Spelling mistakes are another dead giveaway; legitimate companies have quality control processes to prevent such errors. Phrases like "your subscription Norton has expired" are designed to create a sense of urgency, but the awkward wording betrays the email's illegitimate nature. Always scrutinize such emails carefully and never click on any links or provide personal information. It's always better to contact the company directly through official channels to verify any claims made in such emails. Stay vigilant and stay safe online.


