

In early 2025 we plan a number of presentations including Senior Abuse and Internet Security. We also plan a bus trip into the Shrine of Remembrance.


On behalf of the Committee we look forward t seeing you and your wives/partners at the Christmas Function.

A SHORT STORY OF FOAHAL AND THE LASER CUTTER

Hello to all non-existent sane and/or young folk at the Hume Men's Shed. My name's Foahala (silent "o"), and I'm here to share an article regarding a new piece of tech we've recently acquired. Despite my perfectly ordinary and not at all deranged personality, some brave folk have tasked me with learning how our new toy works. If nothing else, I can tell you it's a solid machine to survive this long despite my best efforts to gain enlightenment of its mystical powers: the MW-J750 Laser Cutter.

I'm not great at these show and tells, so I will keep things simple (mostly) by going over basic operations and answering some general questions people have asked me about the laser and how it works.

To operate the laser, we start by creating our design in a CAD (computer-aided design) program called LightBurn. This program provides tools for cutting and engraving, such as typing text in various styles/fonts, drawing lines, circles, and squares, or tracing an image. Once the design is created, we send it to the laser for final adjustments, start it up, and jump behind the nearest piece of solid cover. If everything goes well, it won't explode and should look quite nice (hopefully).

Keep in mind this is a flat 2D platform with a cutting width/height of 700/500mm on a table that can be raised or lowered to a depth of 160-180mm (rough estimate) with or without the honeycomb panel. You could engrave rather girthy (heh) material in it.

Yes, it can cut through wood. From experimenting, I estimate it's capable of cutting through at least 20mm of soft wood such as pine/plywood and 10mm of hard wood. The laser can pass over cuts multiple times if

needed. The material doesn't need to be flat and clean, but a flat and clean surface makes for cleaner cuts and engravings. Different materials, different burns—it's mostly a matter of trial and error if you want to be precise.

It's a fine piece of machinery that allows for great accuracy in a format that can be repeated any number of times. Keep it in mind while working on your own projects. It can make your life a lot easier and add some real character to your work. Templates, artwork, text, cuts, engravings—if you can print it with black ink, the laser can burn it onto material just as nicely.

Finally, if any of this sounds like a pain in the ass or is confusing, I'm more than happy to answer questions and help with projects.


