March 2025

We have received notification from Sam Rae, the local Federal Member that we have approval from the Federal Government to replace the office printer which has reached its 'use by date' and we have had to resort to using a loan machine.

We hope to regain some of the expenditure with a Bunnings Sausage sizzle on the afternoon of Anzac Day and a large Garage Sale on Saturday April 12th so put that in your diary.

The Victor Chang Heart Health Check was conducted with around 42 participants from our Men's Shed the Cobaw Sunbury Shed plus a number of members of the public from our publicity in the local paper. A successful event which no doubt highlighted some risk factors to some of the participants.

Peter C. continues to arrange a procession of informative presenters with Metro in March explaining the Myki Card variations benefits for users. The issue of Elder Abuse is back to the fore on the 16th. April after

the very informative presentation by Sunbury Police with definitions of Elder Abuse when a representative of the Elder Rights Advocacy organization explaining what options are available if you or someone you know encounters Elder Abuse.

Once again, our Maintenance Team has had to carry out maintenance on the Thicknesser. May I remind you it is designed to 'finish' the thickness of timber, not 'rough cutting down' to size of second-hand material which may include imbedded foreign matter e.g. small stones nor is it designed to finish the end grain of material. We ask you all for your assistance in minimising the harsh wear and tear on this machine. If you have second hand material, please consider taking the first cut with a hand operated planer. If you are unsure of the suitability of your job for this or any other machines please ask a member of the Maintenance Team or Barry Kelly.






Try these puzzles for size

Old material to be hand planed (electric planer) first to prevent stones going through thicknesser Barry, Kevin and Stephen to come up with recommendation on usage of thicknesser


